# October 22, 2023 Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

lsaiah 45:1, 4-6 1 Thessalonians 1:1-5b Matthew 22:15-21

"In the divine image He created them male and female; He created them." Genesis 1:27

#### Dear Family,

Each day it seems that we hear about the "transgender" issue. First, I want to say that anyone who is dealing with this issue in their lives has my heartfelt empathy. To be so troubled in life for whatever reason has to be a heavy, heavy cross. So, let's all first pray for anyone who is dealing with this.

You may wonder why I put the word transgender in quotes. It's because no one can transfer from one gender to the other. It is a natural impossibility. So, when we say "so-and-so is transgender" we are using a language of non-reality. It would be akin to saying "I see the western rising sun". We wouldn't say that because it's not real. And, the reason it doesn't make sense is because God didn't create it that way.

There are many complex issues that have contributed to the fact that we are even having this public conversation. I would like to touch on one that I have mentioned before. The reason I am bringing it up again is because I believe it to be the fundamental factor. It is called relativism.

In the early to mid-1600's a French philosopher named Rene Descartes infamously said "Cogito ergo sum" which is Latin for "I think, therefore I am". What's wrong with his comment? It's rather subtle but effective. (Just because something is subtle does not, in any way, mean that it must have little effect.) What's wrong is that his chronology is backward. Our ability to think in no way determines our existence. It might signify it but it doesn't determine it. In fact, I would suggest that this statement did the most to usher in the relativism that we are burdened with today.

So, what is relativism? It basically is the assertion that there is no objective truth; that truth is relative to the person or situation. Decartes' statement essentially says that my thinking brings about my existence. I don't think that's what he intended to say, but that's the effect it has had on people. To suggest that any of us can DETERMINE reality is demonstrably not true.

Reality is what it is. I can't change that. God determined I am a male, not me. Not even my parents could determine my gender, even though they were an integral causal component to my existence. It was ultimately God who determined that I exist at all and, among other things, what gender I would be. Even if I change the externals, they cannot change the essence.

Externals are signs of a deeper reality. An oak tree has oak leaves. Even if I were to remove all the oak leaves and attach maple leaves, it would still be, in its essence, an oak tree. What a thing IS determines what it looks like. What something looks like simply PROCLAIMS what it is; in no way can it DETERMINE what it is.

So, as I said, "transgender" is really a term of non-reality. Just as an oak cannot become a maple, neither can a boy become a girl. As our society struggles under the weight of relativism and as individuals are led astray by so many different problems in our society, let's not belittle, berate, or bash any. Let's just love and pray for all. Let's speak the truth with love and entrust us all to our God who has created and determined all reality.

I hope this is somewhat clear. God bless and Mary keep you all,

\*Sunday October 29th, All Saints Day party in Church Hall at 3pm. Come dressed up for some fun!


